Big question: How did the first five Sikh Gurus shape Sikhism?

Sikhism:

Sikhs believe in One God, for all humanity, who looks at people's actions rather than people's religious labels.

Guru Nanak, the founder, also taught importance of all men and women everywhere being equal, and also the importance of service to others.

Guru Nanak was followed by nine other Gurus.

The tenth **Guru, Guru Gobind Singh**, decided that there would be no more living Gurus and that the **Guru Granth Sahib** (sacred scriptures) should be read for future guidance.

Guru

The term *Guru* comes from the Sanskrit *guru*, meaning teaching, guide or mentor. The traditions and philosophy of Sikhism were established by ten Gurus from 1469 to 1708. Each *Guru* added to and reinforced the message taught by the previous, resulting in the creation of the Sikh religion.
